2014 Aflac WorkForces Report results for the Western United States


Western regional snapshot:

Employers at companies in the Western United States are less likely than those in all other regions to move employees to private exchanges.

More employers in Western states (**49 percent**) than in any other region rely on brokers or insurance companies to suggest changes to their benefits packages due to the changing health care environment.

62 percent of employees are extremely or very satisfied with their jobs, a higher percentage than in any other U.S. region.





The importance of benefits:

Businesses believe benefits are extremely or very influential on:

Job satisfaction – 55 percent. Loyalty to employer – 51 percent. Willingness to refer friends – 37 percent. Work productivity – 39 percent. Decision to leave company – 37 percent.

Yet, employees believe benefits are extremely or very important to:

Job satisfaction – 76 percent. Loyalty to employer – 65 percent. Willingness to refer a friend – 50 percent. Work productivity – 62 percent. Decision to leave company – 52 percent.

Are extremely satisfied with their benefits packages


Believe their benefits packages meet their current family needs extremely well

The study, conducted in January 2014 by Research, captures responses from 1,856 benefits decision-makers and 5,209 employees from across the United States. As part of the fourth annual Aflac WorkForces Report, 488 benefits decision-makers and 1,346 employees in the Western United States² shared their opinions on a variety of workplace-benefits issues.
